## House History of 11349 Champlain Chicago, IL

Once known as 349 Stephenson before 1907.

This historic home is located in the historic Pullman Community which was once known as a company town. The town itself played an important role on the history of Chicago and the United States through its strike in 1894.

The community in which the house is placed was built in the 1880's and not long later we see the first residents of the home appear.




1880's

The earliest evidence these is of residence at 349 Stephenson are from 1889 Andrew Johnson, Charles Oleson, Jacob Erickson, Olfena Weeg, Charles Weeg

Jacob Erikson lives in the residence in 1889 as a Laborer. He is suspected of being colleagues with Charles Olsen as they moved out of the residence together.




Proof of Olsen's Residence in the home in 1889. From this we can interpret he was a machinist.

This 1900 census represents that two people living in Pullman named Charley Oleson and Jacob Erikson live together under 441-Watt Av. There is a high probability it is the same people that lived under 349 Stephenson but there is no certainty.

From this information we know that they were both from Norway. Olsen was aged 32 and Erikson 33.


Olsen was born in Norway in Sep 1867 and immigrated into the states in 1883. By 1900 he is a Naturalized citizen and is single employed as a day laborer. He is well educated as he can read, write and speak English in 1900.




1900 United States Federal Census for Charley Oleson and Jacob Erikson

He is well educated as he can read, write, and speak English in 1900. Olfena Weeg lived with her husband at 349 Stephenson as it the U.s, City Directories it states "wid. Charles" which is her spouse's name Charles Weeg.

These are the years with the introduction of the longest residing family of the house the Johnson's. There is no proof to show that Andrew Johnson was part of their family.

Residing at 349 Stephenson from the Johnson family were Charles August Johnson (Head), Carolina Wilhelmina Johanson (Wife), Charles Elevert Johanson (SON) (Passes away before 1900), and Anna W Johnson (Daughter).

In 1900 there were 5 residences at the address and 4 were born in Sweden and Anna W Johnson (Daughter) was born in Pennsylvania.

Hubel Bordorff (32) was a shipping clerk and Olaf Runsten (27) was an Upholsterer.


Bordorff immigrated in 1888 from Sweden and Runsten in 1892.

From the 1900 Census there is evidence that Carolina Wilhelmina Johanson lost a child as she said she had two and one living in 1900.



Chas A Johnson immigrated in 1865 and his wife followed in 1875. They had 2 kids in Titusville, Pennsylvania. Charles Elevert Johanson (Son) and Anna W Johnson (Daughter).

Swedish flag 1844–1905





Charles Elevert Johanson was born on 11, Oct 1872 in Titusville, Pennsylvania. Anna Wilhelmina Johanson was born on 31, Jul 1874 in Titusville, Pennsylvania.

The family resided at 133 N. 1<sup>st</sup> St. In Titusville, Crawford, Pennsylvania, USA.

Chas A Johnson was a carpenter in 1880 as can be concluded from the 1880 census. He was born in Wadstina Lindk. l. as he recorded in the U.S., Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, Swedish American Church Records, 1800-1947 along with Carolina Wilhelmina Johanson being born in Skeby Lindk. They came West and in 1882 Mr. Johnson bega his Pullman work in the interior finish department, later going into the electric and then the brass, where k stayed until he was pensioned in 1914. Their son Charles, died some years ago, this being the only unhappiness they have suffered. Their daughter, Anna, resides with them. The Rev. Carl A. Tobin of the Lutheran Elim Church, Pullman, arranged suitable services for the evening of Sept. 16, and on the afternoon of the anniversary a dinner was given at the Calumet Commercial Club by some 65 friends and relatives.

The brass department extends heartfelt congratulations. Mr. Jess Hendrix, formerly employed in the planning department, paid the brass department an unexpected visit. Mr. Stewart Reid sold his bome in Roseland and purchased a bungalow in Homewood He will move in the near future. . . Mr. George La Buff met with a serious accident while motoring with his wife and mother-in-law. They are recovering from the injuries received. . . This clipping represents evidence of the Johnson's being married on the 17<sup>th</sup> of September 1872. Chas transitions from carpentry working in the interior finish department in Pullman later to be an Electrician. Shedding a light on the family's involvement in Pullman and the influence of their son's death on the family.



Charles Elevert Johanson Passes away in 1899 and the cause behind his death is unknown. To this point the star marking hasn't been identified and remains a mystery.

### An Aviary Without a Warble



THERE are many ornithologists in the Pullman Car Works, doubtless, but it is asserted that the only bird fancier who possesses an aviary devoid of sound or song is Mr. Charles August Johnson, a pensioner who lives at 11349 Stephenson Street, not far from the big plant where he worked for 32 years. There is an elastic city ordinance against keeping cocks that crow and other feathered nuisances, but Mr. Johnson beat that—he made his own birds and not a one sings a note. If you glance at the picture you can tell why. He made 'em, every one, and lifelike, too, except the music. Mr. Johnson was born in Sweden, Feb. 19, 1842, and entered the Car Works in October, 1882, and after working until March 21, 1914, as a bench hand in the brass and electrical departments he was pensioned.



Some interesting insight into the Passions of Chas A Johnson. Chas was an Ornithologists. He was pensions on the 21<sup>st</sup> of March 1914.



Chas passes away on the 5<sup>th</sup> of Aug 1926 (Illinois, U.S., Deaths and Stillbirths Index, 1916-1947) and his wife Carolina Wilhelmina Johanson follows in 1936. They lay next to their son Charles at Mount Greenwood Cemetery.



The family has a sizable Family tombstone to be remembered by.

Anna Wilhelmina Johanson goes on to move away to Los Angeles, California and passes away on the 10<sup>th</sup> of June 1957. From the California, U.S., Death Index, 1940-1997 there is evidence her mother's Maiden Name was Hultgren.

The Johnson family resided in the home till the 1930's with Anna and Carolina being the last residence.

### Johnson Mystery

In the 1910's it seems that the Johnson's aren't on the Census anywhere in Pullman even though they worked in Pullman.

This means they were still most likely at the home alongside Alfred Williamson (Husband) and Katharine Williamson (Wife) who were both from New York City and they missed Census day.


Alfred worked as an office clerk at the car works in Pullman and rented at the home.

His family immigrated to New York from England.

### Margaret and Charles Toller Both lived at the home as can be indicated by the 1940 Census.



Margaret was previously known by the last name of Zang as can be indicated in the 1930's Census from her marriage with David Zang.

What is interesting is that from the Census it is indicated that she was born in two different countries. First in Italy in the 1930 Census then in Austria in the 1940's Census. But the higher probability is that she was in fact Italian as that was her native language as was indicated in the 1930's Census.

Additional Resident: According to the 1940's Census it is indicated that a Lodger by the name of Ralph Roghier was also living with the two Toller's. He was a naturalized US citizen from Italy working in construction at the age of 60.

## The Second World War

Charles Andrew Toller joined the US Army at the age of 27. He was born on the 11th of February in 1913 and was working for the International Harvester Co before the war as can be indicated by the 1940's Census and his draft card which was filed on the 16th of October 1940.



This Card also provides the new address in which the Toller family resided at the end of the 1940's which was 11271 Champlain Chicago, Cook County.

Looking closer at the address you can see that the numbers have been erased. The last digit was a 9 before it was changed to a 1 possibly indicating how recent the move might have occurred as the last number of 11349 Champlain is 9.

# The Italian Migration 1950's





This ship called "Roma" is the ship which Dominick Zovi came from Genoa, Italy on the 6th of Oct 1930


### Occupations in Pullman:
